The SDGs are the defining global framework of our time, providing a plan of action for people, planet, and prosperity. For People... it aims to end poverty and hunger and to ensure that all human beings can fulfil their potential in dignity and equality and in a healthy environment. For the Planet... it aims to protect the earth from degradation, including urgent action on climate change, so that it can support the needs of present and future generations. For Prosperity... it aims to ensure that all human beings can enjoy prosperous and fulfilling lives in harmony with nature. The SDGs challenge all of us to think, work, and live more sustainably on this planet. Learning for a Sustainable Future® (LSF) is spearheading the implementation of the SDGs in Canada through our focus on educating teachers, engaging in dialogues, convening stakeholders, and empowering youth.

Climate change is one of the most complex and far-reaching challenges of our time, and addressing climate change literacy and education was a key focus for LSF in 2017. Our work focused on innovative educational approaches to help youth understand climate change, define their values, incubate ideas and solutions, and gain skills that will serve them now and throughout their lives. Through stakeholder dialogues, LSF was successful in getting policy and funding support to foster learning experiences for both teachers and students that address the complexity of climate change and take a forward-thinking, action-focused approach to climate change learning.

Our Professional Development Institutes engaged over 1,860 educators from across Canada, providing them with the tools and competencies to teach through an Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) lens. Over 95,000 educators visited our Resources for Rethinking® website to find over 1,300 of the best curriculum-connected sustainability resources to use in their classrooms. Approximately 36,000 students and 1,282 teachers were engaged in sustainability Action Projects in their schools and Youth Forums in their local communities.

As a small organization with a large "handprint," LSF has touched hundreds of thousands of teachers, students, decision makers, and other stakeholders in the past year helping to shape education policy and practice at the local, provincial, national, and international levels.

LSF owes its success to our committed board of directors, honourary advisors, staff, consultants, partners, and funders who enable us to empower our children to change the world.

Our greatest reward is seeing the young people we have engaged demonstrate, through their actions, that there is hope for a more sustainable future.

LSF Generating Ideas: Catherine's Story

atherine O'Brien was completing doctoral research learning about sustainability education through "The Barefoot College" in India. The College educated villages about sustainable agriculture and community development. Catherine found herself in a "culture of joy." It had never occurred to her we could find greater happiness leading a more sustainable life by building more positive relationships with each other and the environment.

Catherine began to dream of changing the conversation around what she called "sustainable happiness"—happiness that contributes to individual, community, and global wellbeing without exploiting other people, the environment, or future generations.

Filled with hope, Catherine met Dr. David V.J. Bell, former Chair of Learning for a Sustainable Future, at a conference. Catherine found great alignment between her own ideas—founded in positive psychology and sustainability—and the forward-thinking vision of LSF.

Catherine O'Brien Associate Professor, Education Department Cape Breton University Catherine helped organize the LSF forum "Pathways to Sustainability" that showcased those who were living and working in sustainable ways. It was a "green" conference, down to the smallest detail of napkins made from scrap material; after three days of meeting, 80 people had produced only one bag of garbage!

Catherine was also the co-developer of a Masters in Education in Sustainability, Creativity and Innovation at Cape Breton University. LSF is a partner for this Masters program, providing program content and workshops, research topics for students, and promotion through our networks.

Catherine applauds LSF for playing "a key role in elevating sustainability discussions in many fora across the country and beyond." She sees LSF at the "forefront of education transformation, not only from the sustainability perspective but because LSF makes the connection to transformative learning, inspiring educators to integrate inquiry-based learning with sustainability. Without LSF's relentless contributions to this field, we would not be where we are today."

LSF Supporting Educators: Tanya's Story

anya Murray was working for one of her school board's Outdoor Centres when she enrolled in a LSF Professional Development Institute. Tanya became a LSF convert and she returned to her workplace with newfound zeal, excited to share the tools and concepts she had learned with her peers to help shift the way they operated their outdoor education programs. Typically, outdoor environmental educators tend to follow the "walk and talk" interpretative hike model, imparting knowledge and providing answers. Tanya was inspired by the LSF concept of letting the students' questions drive the learning. She and her team applied this approach to their pond study days, allowing students to cultivate their curiosity and observation. The pond became a centre of joyful discovery. Students and teachers shared "moments of amazement." Tanya was always a believer in long-term environmental citizenship and "adventure facilitation" but she said LSF's model of inquiry-based learning "shifted the way I envision myself as a teacher. If I am teaching from a place of joy, the students will have joyful learning." She says many of her peers found that this new approach reinvigorated their love of teaching. Tanya has since partnered with LSF again to guide an inquiry approach for her whole staff team as they explored how to incorporate their board's strategic priorities into their classrooms.

Today Tanya is embarking on a new role as an Environmental Literacy and Outdoor Learning Consultant. Tanya thanks LSF for being a source of professional inspiration: "What role has LSF played? When I started teaching I stayed up half the night to know everything inside and out. I was so worried I would be found out as an imposter because I didn't have all the answers. What a weight off my mind to recognize that I too am a learner! We are all learners. Each us brings knowledge; each of us must tap into the group to reach our own potential."

LSF Empowering Youth: Kendra & Sophia's Story

endra Lê is a teacher at St. Mary's
Academy in Winnipeg and a decade
ago, a new student approached her with
a simple question: "Where are the blue bins?".
Kendra took the question to her administrators.
It resonated with the school's mission of nurturing
the positive emotional, physical, and spiritual
wellness of young women and developing them
as leaders with a social conscience. Ten years
later, that social conscience is in full bloom and
Kendra coaches the Green Team. Every spring
the students choose a cause.

Last year, then 16-year-old Sophia noticed that, though compostable plates were used at school events, the cafeteria was still using non-recyclable and non-biodegradable Styrofoam. Sophia and the school Green Team approached the private operator who runs the cafeteria about switching to compostable plates; the operator denied their request because of the higher cost of the eco-friendly plates.

In November, Kendra and the Green Team attended LSF's Our Canada Project Youth Leadership Forum, where they learned lessons about driving social change, shared ideas with other local schools, and created a plan for action.

The team applied for funding through LSF's EcoLeague program to support a pilot run of compostable plates for the cafeteria. They then surveyed the school to see if students would support a price hike on certain menu items to fund the ongoing purchase of the biodegradable plates. They had success on both fronts! After a LSF-funded pilot run, students paid up to a dollar more per dish to support the long-term sustainability of the program.

Sophia says she has learned that "it takes one person to step up with an idea for change". She says "that first step is the hardest. But once you speak up, you find support."

LSF Convening Stakeholders: Gordon's Story

ordon Lambert spent his career convening thought leaders and driving positive change for sustainable development, especially during his 17 years as Vice-President of Sustainability at Suncor. But he was involved in so much more beyond Suncor, including the Alberta Round Table on the Environment and the Economy and the creation of a book called "Changing Course" about the role of business in tackling global sustainability challenges. In 2002, his work caught the attention of the first Chair of the LSF Board, Jack MacLeod, former President, Chief Executive Officer and Director of Shell Canada Limited. Jack recruited Gordon, who became a passionate advocate for the LSF cause.

Gordon admires LSF for building an incredible network of relationships founded in deep expertise, trust, and credibility. He says LSF is a catalyst for change. During his nine years on the Board, he was inspired by all of LSF's programs, particularly where they empower, support, and inspire students to learn about sustainable development and then create real, action-oriented projects. LSF sparks the curiosity in youth that is necessary for change. Gordon remains involved in LSF, recently participating in a LSF dialogue on climate change that brought together 50 diverse leaders from different perspectives: Indigenous, corporate, philanthropic, and educational.

As a grandfather of four, Gordon cares deeply about promoting responsible stewardship so that future generations can inherit a healthy planet. This is the kind of stewardship LSF strives to inspire by giving students and educators hope and knowledge. As Gordon reflects, Martin Luther King could have rightfully railed against injustice and characterized the struggle as a nightmare; instead King chose to "have a dream" that inspired massive change.
